Viewfinder	The "viewfinder" can be placed on a picture in different ways so that different parts of the picture come into view	
Colour wheel	a chart or image meant to help people visualize how colours mix to create new colours.	
Van Gogh	a famous Dutch artist who lived during the 1800s	
Primary colours	the primary colours are red, yellow and blue, these are colours that do not need to be mixed	
Secondary colours	these are colours created by mixing two primary colours	
Bark (tree)	outer covering of woody plants
