Where Africa is on a map.

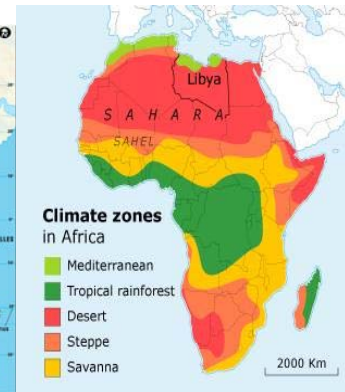
### What I should know at the end of the topic:
