Vocabulary	
Primary colours	Red, Blue and Yellow. These colours cannot be created by mixing other colours.
Secondary colours	Colours that can be created by mixing two primary colours. They are green, orange and purple .
Colours	Primary colours are red, yellow and blue. Secondary colours are made by mixing those.
Mix	To combine or put something together.
Background	The ground or parts of a scene that are behind the main subject of the art work.
Effects	A change which is a result or consequence of an action or other cause .
Paint brush	A brush that you hold like a pencil to paint with.
Print	A print is an impression made by any method involving transfer from one surface to another.
