Parliament	A lawmaking group, in the government of the United Kingdom (Great Britain). The government leader, called the prime minister, is always a member of <b>Parliament</b> .	
Law	Any one rule that government makes and that people in a society must obey.	
Rules	Rules are guidelines for how people should behave. They are based on ideas about what is right and wrong.	
Punishment	A penalty for doing something wrong	
Government	Any group of people living together in a country, state, city, or local community has to live by certain rules. The system of rules and the people who make and administer them is known as a government.
