I observed how punishments have changed over the years.



Vocabulary			
Slave	A slave is classed as property of another person, with no freedom of choice and no money. That person is 'owned' by someone else.		
Slavery	Slavery refers to a condition in which individuals are owned by others, who control where they live and at what they work.		
Transatlantic trade	The three-part transatlantic slave trade that involved taking goods from Britain to Africa to exchange for people. Those people were then taken to America to work as slaves and exchanged for goods which were sold in Britain and Europe.		
Auction	A public sale where goods are sold to the highest bidder.		
Plantation	An estate on which crops, such as coffee, sugar and tobacco are grown.		
Middle Passage	The journey across the Atlantic Ocean that captured Africans were taken on, often in unsanitary conditions.		
Abolition	The act of abolishing a system so that it is no longer permitted.		
William Wilberforce	He was a British politician and a leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade.
