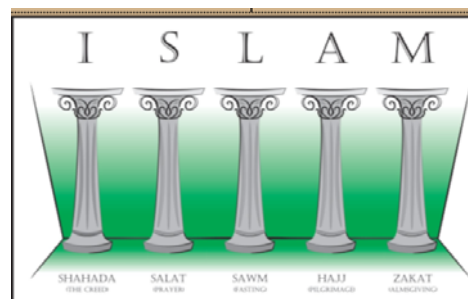
What I should know at the end of the topic:

Vocabulary

Five Pillars	There are five duties that one must live by if one is a Muslim these are often called the Five Pillars of Islam.
Imam	Head of the Muslim community (<i>ummah</i>). The title is found in the Qur'an several times to refer to leaders and to Abraham.
Salat	Prayer.
festival	A special day or period, usually in memory of a religious event, with its own social activities, food, or ceremonies.
Mosque	A building for Islamic religious activities and worship.
Ramadan	It is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting (sawm), prayer, reflection and community.
Eid al-Fitr	It's a festival that marks the breaking of the fast for Muslims at the end
Eid al-Adha	Also known as 'Greater Eid', this festival remembers the prophet Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son.
